

Rudolph Stukenborg Succumbs At Dayton

Heart Attack Takes Native Of
Egypt Vicinity—Funeral
Held Thursday

Rudolph Stukenborg, 68, a native of the Egypt community west of Minster and late in his life a resident here for several years, died suddenly at his home in Dayton at 3 a. m. Monday following a heart attack which he suffered a short time before.

Born on April 1, 1869 near Egypt, the decedent was a son of the late Henry and Antoinette (Huse) Stukenborg. His early education was gleaned in the schools of his home community, and early in life he transferred his residence to a farm near Carthagena.

Prior to residing in Carthagena he went with his parents to Philothia in Mercer county. At the age of 12 he worked on the farm of Theodore Homan and later for John Lochtefeld of St. Rosa, and for several years for L. Woeste at St. Rosa and at St. Anthony.

Then he moved to Carthagena where he rented a farm. In the meantime he was married to Kate Winhoven of St. Wendelin. She was a daughter of the late Peter and Mary Winhoven. Five years after locating in Carthagena he left there and moved to Dayton, where he worked at various occupations for a number of years.

He leaves in addition to his widow the following children: Henry at Dayton, Philomena of Trenton, N. J.; Anna Yankee, of Miamisburg; Mary Meyers of Dayton, and Elida with whom he lived. Brothers living are Henry at Coldwater, Fred at Sidney and Joseph of Minster.

Several years ago Mr. Stukenborg lived here for a period of four years. He built the modern dwelling that is at present owned by Herman Meyer. After disposing of his property he moved back to Dayton.

Funeral services were held at 9 a. m. Thursday at the Lady of Mercy church at Dayton. Interment was made in Calvary cemetery in that city.
